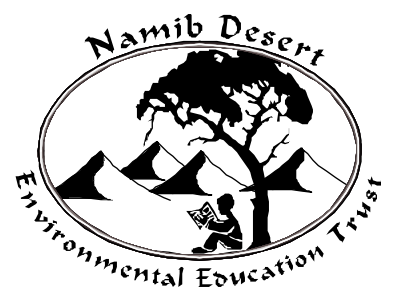

# OVERVIEW

Dear NaDEET Friends,

2009 was a very exciting year for the protection of Namibia's well-known coastal desert environment. Much of this area was previously under diamond mining jurisdiction with the last major parcel of land recently being de-proclaimed. The Namibian government has integrated this section into the existing Namib-Naukluft National Park making the entire coastline of Namibia - stretching 1570 km - one contiguous protected area. This will become the largest park in Africa and the 8<sup>th</sup> largest in the world. We congratulate Namibia on this monumental achievement in time for the celebration of its 20 years of independence on 21 March 2010.



The NamibRand Nature Reserve, NaDEET's home, lies on the eastern edge of this massive desert conservation area and shares with it a 100 km long border. This gives NaDEET an ideal setting to teach environmental education and instil important conservation values in Namibians. During this year's strategic planning we have re-aligned our mission statement to better reflect our core values.

Our sustainable living programmes at **NaDEET Centre** remain in the forefront of environmental education in Namibia and the world, with recognition of our work at the UNESCO World Conference on Education for Sustainable Development in Bonn, Germany, in March 2009. NaDEET is proud to deliver high-quality education in the most cost-effective way possible. Since we first began, NaDEET Centre has hosted over 4000 participants from more than 130 school, youth and adult programmes. Our "practice what we teach" programmes have evolved to meet the changing needs of Namibian children and adults, but they remain focussed on our four priority areas: energy, water, waste and biodiversity.

During this past year we continued with our partnership at the Polytechnic of Namibia by hosting two nature conservation students for six month internships as part of our **capacity building** project. We also hosted two American Global and International Studies Masters students as interns that were involved in all aspects of NaDEET's work.

Our award-winning **environmental literacy** programme published two issues of our bi-annual *Bush Telegraph* magazine on the topics of sanitation and women and the environment. In addition, we also published *It's Time to Change: Learning and Living for Nature*, our first activity book for school children.

2010 brings us several new and exciting projects. With sponsorship from the UNDP Global Environment Facility- Small Grants Programme, we will be hosting five adult groups comprised of community members from the southern regions of Namibia. The community members will participate in a week long, hands-on practical training in sustainable living at NaDEET Centre. Upon completion of the course, they will take home their own parabolic solar cookers, solar ovens, fuel-efficient stoves and recycled fire bricks. This is the first time that NaDEET has received funding to assist communities and provide direct access to these important sustainable living technologies.

This funding will also allow us to develop two more books for our environmental literacy programme. The books are designed for adults, but will also be appropriate for teenagers and young adults. They are entitled *It's Time to Solar Cook* and *It's Time to Be Efficient: A Guide to Sustainable Living in Namibia*.

With a recently signed agreement with the US Peace Corps, we will be hosting one of their volunteers for a two year period, beginning in April 2010. We believe this will assist us to continue to strengthen our environmental education programme at NaDEET Centre.



We gratefully thank all of our donors and friends for your on-going support of our important environmental education work. By "practicing what we teach" we strive to be an environmental role model for others to follow, so we all may live in a more sustainable world.

2009 was a record year for NaDEET. Altogether 25 groups participated in an environmental education programme at NaDEET Centre - the highest number since NaDEET's start in 2003 and an increase of 25% compared to 2008! In total 632 school-aged children and 167 adults were hosted at our Centre. It is noteworthy that, except for two, all groups that were at NaDEET Centre in 2008 returned again in 2009. We also welcomed seven new groups this past year.

Our long-term aim, and part of our strategic plan for 2009-2012, is for all schools from the Hardap region to come to NaDEET at least once. This aim is well underway with 56% of all schools visiting NaDEET Centre in 2009 originating from the South of the country. Thank you to the Netherlands Embassy, the &Beyond Foundation, the Wolwedans Foundation and

the Windhoek Rotary Club for assisting underprivileged children from this region to visit NaDEET Centre.

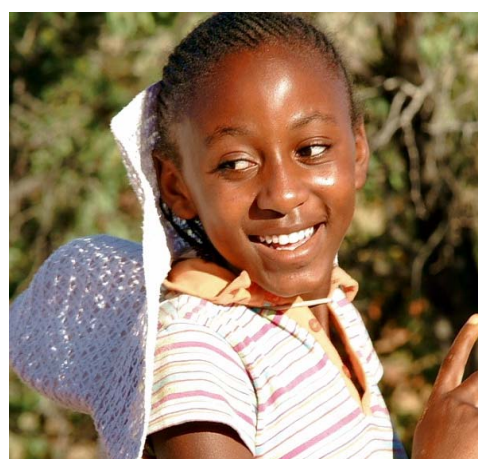
Compared to 2008 NaDEET doubled the number of adult groups that visited the Centre (from 3 to 6). We expect that this trend will also continue in 2010 due to our new community group project.

**Vision:**  
**To be a leader and model of Centre-based sustainable living education**

With funding from the NedBank Go Green Fund we implemented a special secondary school programme with six schools focused on environmental leadership and research skills. We have used this project to enhance and improve our secondary school programme. Our primary school programme also has successfully undergone a re-vamp with improved activities and a new "sustainable living journal".

## **A look ahead: Local community groups will receive training at NaDEET Centre**

With funding from the UNDP Global Environmental Facility Small Grants Programme local community groups will receive training at NaDEET Centre. Through this training and the distribution of solar cookers and fuel efficient stoves to the communities, NaDEET will contribute to removing barriers to sustainable living technologies.



# ENVIRONMENTAL AUDIT 2009

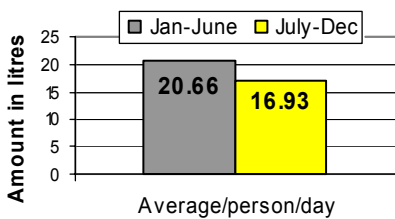
This year's environmental audit, implemented through a NaDEET Centre activity entitled "Measuring our Enviro Footprint", once again provided participants and staff with interesting results. By scrutinizing the environmental impact of our water and energy use and waste production, we can monitor and reduce our overall footprint.



## Water

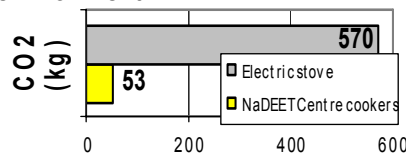
Last year we reported on a worrying trend of increased water consumption/person. We believed this was due to the limited way we were able to measure our hot water use. Previously, we were only able to monitor hot water used for the whole group instead of per shower unit. With the installation of additional water meters in July 2009, we are pleased that there was an immediate decline with an average decrease of 4 litres/person/day. The additional water meters enable students to examine their water usage within teams, allowing students to relate their personal actions more directly to the water count.

## Energy

Our energy audit investigates electricity usage and CO<sub>2</sub> emissions produced by different cooking energy sources. NaDEET Centre is completely powered by solar electricity and audited by a simple battery monitor. As part of the programme, participants record and compare their daily electricity consumption. In 2009, 83% of Centre cooking was with solar cookers and ovens, 10% in a fuel-efficient stove and 9% on a gas stove. Our cooking energy audit takes this information and calculates the CO<sub>2</sub> emissions produced. Comparing these results with the amount of CO<sub>2</sub> emissions that would have been produced had an electric stove been used instead shows the greatly diminished impact our energy use has on the environment.

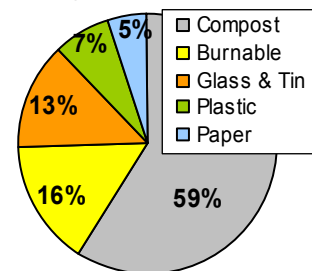


## Waste

With cooperation from numerous partners, we are now able to recycle not only glass, tin and compost, but also paper and plastics. Compost continues to be recycled on-site and other recyclables are taken to Windhoek. This improved system has reduced by half our burnable waste which is incinerated at NaDEET base.

The waste audit results show a clear difference in waste produced by adult and children groups at the Centre and between rural and urban groups. With access to money and goods, more waste is produced.

# CAPACITY BUILDING

This year we had two University of California, Santa Barbara Master's students intern with us for six months for the first time. Alanna Pardee interned at NaDEET Centre and worked on our environmental literacy project while Benjamin Burghart focused on fundraising and marketing. Students from the Polytechnic of Namibia Nature Conservation course continue to be an asset to NaDEET while the students gather invaluable experiences through their hands-on work here. Recent students are Viktoria Endjala and Ruusa Gottlieb who is conducting a study about the composition of recycled paper fire bricks to make them more efficient. We also recently received a letter from former student Viktoria highlighting the impact of her internship at NaDEET:

*Today I was looking at the NaDEET website and was impressed with everything you are doing. I congratulate you for that. I have joined the Polytech Environmental Club and I hope to apply what I have learned at NaDEET because they want to create more awareness on the 3Rs and I cannot wait to do something useful with the knowledge I gained there.*

NaDEET's contribution to the Namibian Environmental Education Certificate (NEEC) course continued as Viktoria Keding once again was the external moderator for the course in December.



# ENVIRONMENTAL LITERACY

## Bush Telegraph

In 2009 NaDEET produced another two issues of our award-winning *Bush Telegraph* youth magazine. This year's issues were generously funded by the UNESCO-Windhoek Cluster office, as valuable contributions to the Decade of Education for Sustainable Development. The issues investigated sanitation and the role women play in promoting a sustainable environment. More than 13 000 children and educators are subscribed to receive the free *Bush Telegraph* magazine. Nelson, a learner from Walvis Bay recently wrote to us to say, "Thank you *Bush Telegraph* for being a loyal educator. NaDEET has given me lots of knowledge over the years". We are pleased that UNESCO will continue to fund two new issues of the *Bush Telegraph* in 2010.

## Activity Book: "It's Time to Change"

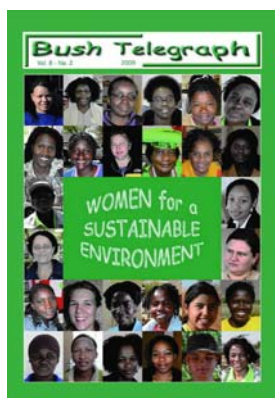
In 2009 Director Viktoriya Keding took the knowledge and experience gathered from NaDEET Centre programmes and released it in book form: *It's Time to Change – Learning and Living For Nature*. True to its title, the book, which is primarily designed for Namibian school children, includes 13 pages of fun-filled activities, powerfully demonstrating the imminent necessity of adopting a more sustainable lifestyle. It makes environmentalism come alive by illustrating solutions to environmental problems typical for Namibia and particularly focuses on the Namib Desert ecosystem. Together with NaDEET Centre participants, all schools in the country have also received free copies.

## Award-winning work

Our environmental literacy work was again recognized as we received third place in the Eco Media Awards 2009 in the "Publisher House" category. The Eco Media Awards is hosted by the Eco Awards and Namibia Breweries to acknowledge outstanding contributions to the field of environmental journalism. NaDEET was recognised for the *Bush Telegraph* issue on sanitation and our new activity book *It's Time to Change*.

## A look ahead: New "It's Time to ..." series to be launched

In addition to two new issues of the *Bush Telegraph*, NaDEET is working on a series of booklets on sustainable living including *It's Time to Solar Cook*, *It's Time to be Efficient* and *It's Time to Identify*.

# CAPITAL EXPENDITURE PROJECTS

After six years of operation, NaDEET Centre's living facilities need to be renovated. We successfully started this long-term project with the rebuilding of the six original showers including plumbing making them easier to use. US volunteers and artists Jon Leavitt and Haven Tyler is currently painting desert murals in each shower to remind visitors to save water. In order to better handle all our classroom tables and chairs, a new versatile storage bench has been built inside the main building. Our new metal stand has been built for our Centre water tank.

NaDEET Base was vastly improved for staff and visitors. This includes a garden area, a solar cooking deck, and a wind generator. A mural and sustainable living information signs by volunteers Cheryl Walpole and Christi Meyer give a friendly welcome to all visitors. A volunteer house was expanded during April/May to accommodate the Keding family.

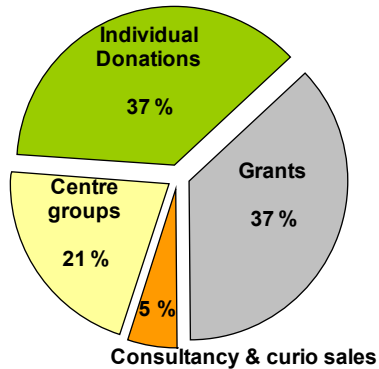
### New accommodation houses for NaDEET Centre

In 2010 we must renovate our current accommodation houses at NaDEET Centre as several are beyond repair. These houses were originally built in 2003 with 'second-hand' wood generously donated by our neighbours, Wolwedans Lodge.

We aim to build an improved design that is better equipped against extremely cold winter nights and summer rain. We are currently in the design phase and are researching ideas and significant funding for this necessary project.

# FINANCES & FUNDING

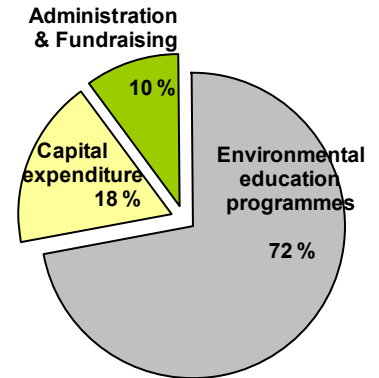
## Income



After a good financial year in 2008, this past year unfortunately left us with a negative balance. Our total income was only N\$878,000 (€80,000, USD125,000) and our expenditure was N\$1,13 million (€103,000, USD160,000) as budgeted. This has left us with a deficit of approximately N\$250,000.

All of our usual income sources generated between N\$25,000 and N\$75,000 less income in 2009 than the year before. This can most likely be attributed to the unfortunate worldwide financial crisis. Our decreased group income was due to the lack of co-funding for several low to middle income school groups that we welcomed with our open door policy, whereby all children may visit NaDEET Centre regardless of ability to pay.

## Expenditure



Our increased expenditure was primarily due to an increase in our programme output. As reported throughout the *Annual Mole*, we had a record number of groups and were highly productive in all other project areas as well. In addition we had large volunteer staff and one additional paid staff member in 2009. Lastly our Centre expenditures increased due to the steady increase of food costs.

Financial Consulting Services (FCS) is NaDEET's accounting firm. Exchange rates used 1€= N\$11, USD1= N\$7

## Fundraising

As a non-profit and non-governmental organisation, NaDEET depends highly on private and public funding. This past year, as reported in our finances, was challenging in this regard. However, we are very pleased that we had a very successful fundraiser in the US in May and that many of our regular grant-givers continued to support our projects in 2009.

For NaDEET Centre programmes in 2009 we received grants from NedBank Namibia Go Green Fund, Netherlands Embassy, &Beyond Foundation, Wolwedans Foundation and Rotary Club Windhoek. The German Development Agency (DED) and the "Deutsche Gesellschaft für Technische Zusammenarbeit" (GTZ) both funded learning materials for NaDEET Centre. Several companies also provided us with discounts on our purchases and donated goods.

UNESCO Windhoek cluster office enabled us to produce two more issues of the *Bush Telegraph* to give school aged children a better understanding of environmental issues. They have also pledged their continued support for 2010 for our key environmental literacy project. For general support we have received funds from the Lions Club Windhoek, Pupkewitz Foundation, &Beyond and the NamibRand Conservation Foundation. We are also proud to have received a large grant to mitigate climate change from the UNDP Global Environmental Facility Small Grants Programme. This grant will sponsor our environmental education project for community groups that started at the beginning of 2010.

The new supporting organisation "Freundschaft mit NaDEET" is off to a good start since April 2009. It has planned several different fundraising activities in Germany to generate more support for our work in the upcoming year. "Freundschaft mit NaDEET" members will travel to Namibia in October this year and spend a week at NaDEET to learn about our work first-hand.

## A look ahead: Concerts in Europe for NaDEET

In France and Germany our support organizations are hosting concerts to raise funds for NaDEET. Long time NaDEET supporter, Bruno Panabieres, is hosting another family and friends concert in Marseilles in March and Freundschaft mit NaDEET is hosting a gospel workshop and concert in May. 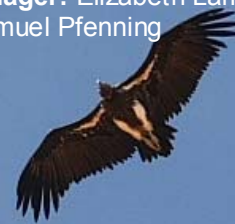
